The Law and Your Business

The law and Your Business- Proposed Legislation

The 2025 General Session of the Florida Legislature is scheduled to convene in March. NUCA has scheduled a “walking the halls” to meet with our elected officials for March 30- April 2 and you should make plans to attend, especially if you’ve never witnessed an active session of the Florida legislature. There are already hundreds of bills being considered but there is one that is probably important to all NUCA members. The value of safety and the well being of our employees and the general public are foremost concerns in the industry. There is being proposed a bill that would add additional responsibilities to a contractor to assure that its employees do not suffer any heat illness.

HB35/SB 510 Heat Illness Prevention (“HP Bill”) is an amendment to Ch 448.112, FS- and would be applicable to utility contracting. Some of the highlight requirements being proposed include:

1. The contractor would have to make available an effective voice, observational, or electronic communication system that allows an employee to contact an employer, a manager, a supervisor, a contractor, or an emergency medical services provider if necessary.
2. The contractor must provide a sufficient amount of cool or cold drinking water at a location that is quickly and easily accessible from the area where employees work to accommodate all employees throughout the workday and remind employees throughout the workday to consume such water.
3. The contractor must ensure that each employee takes a 10-minute recovery period every 2 hours that the employee is working in an outdoor environment under high-heat conditions. The recovery period may be concurrent with a meal period required by law if the timing of the recovery period coincides with a required meal period. If an employee exhibits mild to moderate signs or symptoms of heat illness, the employer must relieve the employee from duty, provide him or her with access to shade for at least 15 minutes or until such signs or symptoms of heat illness have abated, and monitor the employee to determine whether medical attention is necessary.
4. Contractor must establish a program to provide financial relief, promotional support, and loss coverage to small businesses adversely impacted by state and local government construction projects, ensuring their resilience and viability during essential infrastructure improvements.

The full text can be found on-line or can call me directly if you have any questions or comments. I hope to see you in Tallahassee for the NUCA legislative event. It is not uncommon that the language of a proposed bill is amended as it goes through the subcommittee process, so the requirements recited above could change at any time.

DOD Eliminates PLA Agreements In Military Construction Contracts

The U.S. Dept. of Defense announced Feb. 11 that it will eliminate the Biden-era rule requiring "project labor agreements" (PLA) for its departmental projects. DOD instructed its contracting officers to halt the use of these agreements on large-scale military construction projects. NUCA criticized this rule when it was announced in 2023, as it could increase construction costs by up to 20% and was unfairly disqualifying suitable contractors from federal projects. However, this unnecessary rule remains in effect--for now--in other U.S. departments.

Kramer Nominated to EPA Office of Water

On Feb. 13 President Trump nominated Jessica Kramer to serve as the EPA Assistant Administrator for the Office of Water, the regulating body that manages the Drinking Water SRF and the Clean Water SRF. She served as policy counsel in the Office of Water during President Trump's first term. Post -2021, she worked on the Senate's Environment and Public Works Committee staff for Sen. Shelly Capito (R-WV), where she managed drinking water and wastewater issues. Kramer is a known voice for reasonable standards in environmental and permitting regulations, and NUCA strongly supports her nomination to this important office. She will face a confirmation vote in her former Senate committee in the weeks ahead, but has already joined EPA's staff. NUCA is seeking an appointment with her for our upcoming policy conference in D.C.

Regulations Could Face CRA Repeal

The Congressional Review Act (CRA) carryover period, the window during which the next Congress can target Biden administration regulations for repeal using the CRA's expedited procedures, is likely to end on May 12, 2025. Several industry regulations may face repeal.

Trump Administration opponents estimate at least 50 rules, issued toward the end of the Biden administration's term, are vulnerable to repeal and likely to be targeted. Several EPA rules enacted under the Inflation Reduction Act, U.S. Treasury rules for energy investment credits, new USDOL rules on PPE, as well as an EPA rule finalizing requirements for drinking water systems to replace lead service line, may face repeal under CRA. At this early stage of the session, nothing has been introduced under the CRA for repeal.

NUCA is watching these potential CRA votes closely. While we support efforts to remove lead from drinking water pipes, we urge the incoming administration and Congress to provide appropriate funding and flexibility for this valuable program to avoid creating an unfunded mandate.

Suicide Prevention in Construction

There are many articles being published recently concerning the suicide rate in construction compared to other causes of worker deaths. The rate of suicide for construction workers is 5.5 times the rate of all other construction fatalities on the jobsite. Suicide in construction is also 2.4 times higher than all industries. In researching causes as to why construction is so much higher it has been found that, most times in a male dominated work environment there is the “tough guy” mentality. This macho mentality may create a hesitance in sharing something that might be considered a weakness. Alcohol, work stress, marital difficulties, a feeling of loneliness, isolation, bullying, are all contributors. Because the industry attracts people who gravitate to outdoor activities like hunting, there is easy access to the means for suicide. Many construction worker suicides are listed as firearms related. Causation is complex. Many workers feel that they cannot take time off, even if they are hurt or in pain because they need to keep working to support their families. Working under production pressures also creates stress. Sleep deprivation, family issues, drug abuse and depression add to a tendency to “look for a way to end the pain”.

We need to ask ourselves how we can end this trend. Building a culture of care is one way. EAP programs and education are effective. Training safety people and field managers to recognize some of the symptoms is another effective process. Things like anger, depression, isolation from activities, missing work can all be identifiers. Asking a person if they are considering suicide has zero influence on the decision to attempt it. Very often, it only takes intervention by asking that to deter the decision and impulse. Many suicide decisions are temporary and taking action can prevent the ideation from becoming an action. September is suicide prevention month. Planning activities during this time can increase the education and development of assistance programs. For additional information, google suicide prevention. The national suicide hot line is 988, call or text, but there are also local help lines and resources available and some of these should be identified in the EAP list of other services. Suicides can be prevented. Get involved.


